Lloyd Bockstruck will be featured speaker at CGS Spring Seminar

Lloyd Bockstruck, M.A., MLS, FNGS, of Dallas, will be the guest lecturer at the 2008 CGS Spring Seminar co-sponsored with the Denver Public Library. The Seminar will be held on April 18 and 19. On Friday evening, April 18, Mr. Bockstruck will present "Research along the Ohio River" at the regular CGS membership meeting at Christ the King Lutheran Church, 2300 South Patton Court, in Denver, held from 7-9 pm.

On Saturday, April 19, Mr. Bockstruck will present four lectures at an all-day seminar in the Lower Level Conference Center of the Central Denver Public Library. Mr. Bockstruck's lectures are designed to guide researchers down the Ohio River to Missouri and beyond.

The Program

• Arriving in Missouri

Rivers brought many settlers; some came by land. The Catholic French and Spanish prohibited "Yankee Protestants" until the possibility of war with the British changed their minds. What was the migration pattern? How did settlers travel? What motivated them?

• Where They Lived

The year of arrival, origin, ethnicity, religion, transportation, and topical features of land all influenced this. Different groups settled north and south of the Missouri River. Who were they?

What They Did

Your ancestors' skills played a part in their settlement patterns. Varying climates and soils influenced crop choices. Rivers, timber, and mines abounded. Did they settle on a farm and move to the city or vice-versa?

• Who Stayed, Who Left, Why?

Weather, earthquakes, Indian treaties, available employment, slavery, and Civil War sympathies, and Order No. 11 dispersed many to another area. Some moved to another area in the state; some chose to leave. Mr. Bockstruck will suggest where they may have gone and strategies for finding them.

The Seminar

There is a \$30.00 materials fee for this all-day Saturday seminar. The Library opens at 9:00 a.m. The Seminar will begin promptly at 10:00 a.m. CGS will provide a selection of beverages and complimentary morning snacks. You are welcome to bring a lunch. We again offer the option

The Speaker

Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck has been with the Dallas Public Library since 1973 and is currently Supervisor of the Genealogy Section. An Illinois native, he graduated A.B. (cum laude), majoring in Biology and Chemistry He served in the Missionary Journeyman Program of the Southern Baptist Conference assigned to the Baptist Mission of East Africa. There he served as a teacher and librarian in the Mombasa (Kenya) Baptist High School. Returning to Illinois, he was a Graduate Assistant both while earning his M.A. in European History and in the University of Illinois School of Library Science while earning his MLS. He has also taught at Southern Methodist University in the Dept. of Continuing Education.

Mr. Bockstruck is an Outstanding Alumnus and the senior ranking faculty member at the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research-Samford University, in Birmingham, AL. He has been a faculty member at The Genealogical Institute of Mid-America, University of IL-Springfield since 1994.

Mr. Bockstruck has published several books including Virginia's Colonial Soldiers; Research in Texas; Revolutionary War Bounty Land Grants Awarded by State Governments; Family Tree: Weekly Newspaper Columns from the Dallas Morning News 1991-1996; Naval Pensioners of the United States 1800-1851; Denizations and Naturalizations in the British Colonies in America, 1607-1775; and Bounty and Donation Land Grants in British Colonial America.

Mr. Bockstruck has been recognized by a number of awards for his work in the field of genealogy:

1983 - Award of Merit, National Genealogical Society

1992 - Fellow, National Genealogical Society

1994 – Distinguished Service Award, Dallas Genealogical Society (Award named in his honor)

1999 – Filby Prize for Genealogical Librarianship (the first Filby recipient)



Kathy will discuss Colorado sources and repositories useful for discovering more about the gold miners, gamblers, outlaws, fancy ladies, farmers, TB patients and pioneers who populated our state.

DPL Receives Grant to Digitize Denver Historic Neighborhoods

The Institute of Museum and Library Services has awarded the Denver Public Library's Western History/Genealogy Department a \$778,000 grant to fund its "Creating Communities: Digitizing Denver's Historic Neighborhoods" project. DPL holds many organizational papers, plats, and renovation records for most of the neighborhoods that make up the Denver metro area.

NGS has placed one million ancestral names online in MACs

Members of NGS have access to Member Ancestry Charts (MACs), family trees completed and submitted by NGS members and uploaded by more than 100 NGS volunteers. All names are searchable, including separate entries for women's maiden and married surnames. NGS members can go to www.ngsgenealogy.org and click on the members only tab for access to the database.

Genealogy Center opened in Aberdeenshire, Scotland

The newly opened genealogy research center in Peterhead, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, is located in a room in the Arbuthnot Museum at Peterhead's St Peter Street where a wealth of documentation can already be found. Records available at the research center include tax records dating to the 1690s, burial records dating from 1841, and registrars' birth, marriage, and death records dating from 1855.


President: Carol Darrow 2009 Nomination Committee: Roger Dudley, Sandy Carter-Duff, and Gwen Mayer

Seminar Speaker Bockstruck Highlights Missouri Crossroads

The CGS Annual Seminar, held April 18-19, featured guest lecturer Lloyd Bockstruck, M.A., MLS, FNGS, nationally recognized historian and speaker. In the Friday night presentation, "Exploring Down the Ohio River," Mr. Bockstruck described the origins of the several groups who settled in Ohio and subsequently moved on down the Ohio River to Indiana, Illinois, and Missouri.

One hundred gathered in the Lower Conference Center at the downtown Denver Public Library on Saturday, April 19, to hear Mr. Bockstruck present four lectures covering Missouri history and development from its French and Spanish government periods to the Civil War. Mr. Bockstruck stressed the importance of casting a wider search for Missouri ancestors that includes the French records at Quebec and New Orleans as well as the territorial records of Indiana and Illinois and the Bureau of Land Management records for each of these states.

Beginners' Corner

If you're just getting started in genealogy, some of the terms may seem confusing.

Let's talk about "citing your sources." You may hear that it's extremely important but you aren't sure where to begin.

The easiest way to remember to cite your sources is to think about the time that you found information about your grandmother's career as a teacher that was in a county history book. You photocopied the page and put it in your files—but you didn't write down the title of the book. Your cousin doesn't believe that your grandmother was ever a teacher and she wants to see this story for herself. You remember that it was in a big fat brown book at Denver Public Library but you don't remember the title of the book.

Now is the time to make a resolution to write in the margin of every piece of information you collect: the title of the book, the author, and the page number. If it's a census record, you need to record the year of the census, the county and state, the roll number, and the page number. If it's a story that was told to you by your aunt, you need to write down her name and the date of the conversation as documentation.

Elizabeth Shown Mills has produced two excellent guides to writing citations: *Evidence!* Citation & Analysis for the Family Historian and Evidence Explained. If you have the basic information (title, author, page number), you will be able to go back and put that information into the recommended format when you publish your family history. In the meantime, you'll also be able to direct your cousin to the proper source.

Buyer Beware of Web Sites

In a warning posted on Ancestry.com blog by Mike Ward, there are three potentially fraudulent genealogical sites that appear to offer less than promised while purporting to look like sites associated with Ancestry.com. The sites include SearchYourGenealogy.com, Ancestry-search.com, and Australian-Ancestry.com. Ward states that these sites are not connected with Ancestry.com although the graphics and design may make them appear similar.

Proposed Bylaws Changes to be Voted on at Annual Meeting Consolidate Position of Secretary

Proposed Bylaws changes to be presented to membership for vote at Annual Meeting, June 20, 2008. Many of the changes involve the proposed elimination of the position of Corresponding Secretary. CGS will retain the position of Recording Secretary, now to be referred to simply as Secretary. Additions are in **bold print**, deletions are lined through.

- ARTICLE III Membership and Dues Section A.
 Membership. Any applicant interested in furthering the objectives of this Society shall be eligible for membership upon submission of a completed application form and payment of dues.
 Any member whose dues are current shall be considered a "member in good standing." Changes in classes of membership and the amount of dues shall be proposed by the Board of Directors and approved by the general membership at the Annual Meeting.
- ARTICLE V Meetings
 Section C. Annual Meeting
 1. Posting of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting previously approved by the Minutes Approval Committee.
 - 2. Reading Posting of the Financial Report.
 Section D. Quorum. A quorum shall be thirty
 members in good standing a majority of those
 members in good standing who are
 present.
- **3.** ARTICLE VI Board of Directors Section A. The officers of the Society shall be the President, Vice President, the most recent Past President willing to serve, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer.
- **4.** ARTICLE VII Executive Committee Section A. The Executive Committee shall consist of the **four** elected officers of the Society, and the Past President.
- 5. ARTICLE VIII Nominations, Terms, and Elections
 Section D. Election of the President and the Corresponding Secretary and three (3) members of the Nominating Committee shall be at the Annual Meeting in even-numbered years.
 Section E. Election of the Vice President, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and three (3) members of the Nominating Committee shall be at the Annual Meeting in odd-numbered years.
 Section F. Voting shall be by a show of hands or voice provided that there is only one candidate for each office. Only those members in good

- **standing are eligible to vote**. If more than one candidate is running for any office, the voting shall be by written ballot **of those members in good standing** in attendance at the Annual Meeting. A majority vote elects.
- **6.** ARTICLE IX Responsibilities of Elected and Appointed Officials

Section B. The President shall:

- 2. Sign, with the Recording Secretary, all legal documents on behalf of the Society. Section D. The Recording Secretary shall:
- 5. Be responsible for receiving, processing, and distributing to appropriate officials all mail received by the Society at its official address. Assignment can be made to another member of the Board if that person is willing to assume the duty.

 6. Be responsible for responding to correspondence at the request of the President.

Section E. The Corresponding Secretary shall:
1. Assume the Presidency in the absence, incapacity, or resignation of all of the following: President, Vice President, and Recording Secretary or at the request of the President.

- 2. Be responsible for receiving, processing, and distributing to appropriate officials all mail received by the Society at its official address and for mailing the Society's official periodical and newsletter.
- 3. Be responsible for responding to correspondence at the request of the President. Section F. Treasurer shall:
- 1. Assume the presidency in the absence, incapacity, or resignation of all of the following: the President, Vice President, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary.
- 3. Select and appoint, **when necessary**, the Chairman and members for each of the following committees and serve on each in an ex-officio capacity: Financial Planning; Budget. Section G. The Past President shall:
- 3. Serve on the Executive Committee.
- 7. ARTICLE XI Affiliates [refers to 5 or more individuals, who are not within a geographical area served by an existing genealogical society, who desire to create a group whose purposes are related to the objectives of the Society.]

 Section G. The affiliate shall designate a chairperson, whose duties will be to schedule meetings and events, and to submit an Annual Report to the Society Recording Secretary at least thirty days prior to the end of the fiscal year.



Beginners' Corner

Beginners are always urged to get the birth and death certificates for the members of their immediate family. Although the federal government required birth and death registration in 1913, both official certificates were not regularly kept by all county governments until about 1920.

Today, because of concerns about identity theft, many states are limiting access, especially to birth certificates that could be used to establish an illegal identify. Death certificates are more readily available but often the requestor is required to send a photocopy of a driver's license to establish their own identity. There are also states that require the requestor to be a direct descendant of the deceased. Colorado is such a state.

Here are the steps that will lead you to that vital record necessary for your research:

- Figure out the county as it was at the time of the birth or death. Remember Broomfield was in Boulder County until 2001. A quick way to do this is to go to www.epodunk.com and enter the town and the state. The county will be supplied.
- 2. Narrow down the year of death. Some counties charge more if they have to do an extended search over several years.
- 3. Go to the Internet and Google "Pennsylvania Death Certificates," for example.
- 4. DO NOT use the ChekVitalRecords link that will come up. They charge an extra fee of \$25 plus the fee charged by the county.
- 5. DO look for the State Department of Health in the state of interest.
- 6. Read the directions for requesting a birth or death certificate. If necessary, call the phone number listed on the website for more information.
- 7. Print out the online form or write a letter requesting the certificate.
- 8. Most websites will tell you what the fee is usually \$5 to \$15 for each certificate.
- 9. Many will require some identification, usually a photocopy of your driver's license.
- 10. Most require that you identify your relationship to the deceased person.
- 11. Some may require that you include a business size self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE) with your request.
- 12. Be sure to include your complete name, mailing address, telephone number and email, if you have one, on both the letter and the SASE.



Beginner's Corner

Everybody talks about Ancestry.com but you may not know that Ancestry Library Edition, which includes both the U.S. Deluxe Version and the World Edition of Ancestry.com (valued at about \$300/year), is available for free at all Denver Public Libraries, Westminster Public Libraries, and at the National Archives (Bldg. 46) at the Federal Center.

If you are new to genealogy or haven't looked at Ancestry, you are missing out on the largest collection of databases available online. Ancestry includes images and an every-name index to all the U.S. federal censuses. Ancestry has also added several state censuses as well. Then there are the military databases including the World War I Draft Registration Cards, World War II Army Volunteers 1939-1946, and Civil War Soldier Index. There are birth, marriage, and death indexes for most states and some divorce indexes, too. New in the past year are ship passenger lists.

Before you pay for at home access, gather up your papers and go off to a public access site and test drive the system. If you have done online research before and are comfortable with the computer, you will probably have a wonderful experience.

But if you are not familiar with online research, you may need to learn a few tricks to make Ancestry deliver on its promise.

- 1. Ancestry databases were indexed by human beings who often made mistakes in reading the handwriting of the census taker. Although you may know that your grandfather's first name was Zarah, the transcriber may have rendered that name in a variety of ways.
- Census takers themselves made mistakes that can only be transcribed as the indexer saw them. Elmo Harrow, for example, was listed by the census taker as Harrow Elmo, the head of the Elmo family.
- 3. Search screens on the Home page will force you to sort through hundreds, perhaps thousands, of John Johnsons

- before getting to yours. Go instead to the "Search" screen and select the type of record you want to look at U.S. Censuses or Birth, Marriage, Death Records, or Military Records. Then add the name, birthplace and birth date to search for the record you want.
- 4. There is a new version of Ancestry (friendlier but not helpful) that asks you to enter the complete name as first, middle, last. This search method does not work well when you have only the last name or even if you're searching by first name, birth date and birthplace. Look for the option at the top of the screen to "Switch back to the old search experience."
- 5. Less is more. When you are entering information for a search of Ancestry databases, the most useful information is first name, last name, year of birth, and birthplace. If you get more than 25 hits, you probably need to add more information to narrow down the search.
- 6. Search and search again. New databases are added weekly for example, the ship passenger lists are new this year. So come back often and look again.

Put History Into Your Family History

Mona Lambrecht spoke to CGS at the program meeting on Oct. 17 about putting historical context into your family history.

Here's an historic event that could certainly have impacted your ancestors: The year 1816 was widely known as "The Year Without Summer." Connecticut was hit by a blizzard on June 6; Savanna, Georgia had a high temperature of 46°F on July 4. Crops failed and dire warnings of impending doom were pronounced by many church groups. Modern scientists believe the cause of the extreme weather was dust and ask from the April 5, 1815 eruption of the Tambora volcano on the island of Sumbawa near Java. But the effects were felt around the world.

How do you think a New England farmer would have been affected? Snow and killing frosts in May and June destroyed much of New England's crops. The price of corn and other grains rose rapidly for the small available supply. The price of oats, necessary to feed horses, went from 12 cents a bushel to 92 cents a bushel.

Many historians consider the "Year Without Summer" a primary motivation in 1817 for westward migration out of New England and into Western New York, Ohio, Indiana, and the Upper Midwest. Was this the factor that caused your ancestor to relocate?

Lineage Society for Descendants of Early Settlers of Spanish and Mexican Land Grants Formed

Early Settlers of Spanish and Mexican Land Grants (ESSMLG) lineage society is the first national lineage society to recognize and preserve the contributions of the Spanish/Latino culture in early U.S. settlements. Early settlers of the southwest U.S. included Spaniards, Canary Islanders, French, Irish, English, Scots, Jews, German, Dutch, Portuguese, and Native Americans from both sides of the present day U.S. Mexico border.

The mission of ESSMLG is to research, preserve, and promote the history, heritage and culture of early settlers on Spanish and Mexican land grants.

Nine Million Philadelphia Records are Now Online

FamilySearch.org has placed two historical Philadelphia city record sets online. These include death certificates for 1803-1915 and marriage indexes for 1885-1951.

These records are part of the Family History Library's extraordinary effort to place indexes of its microfilm holdings on line. The project adds new indexes almost daily so it's worth checking back frequently. The website is http://pilot.familysearch.org/recordsearch/start.ht

Writing Contest Opens for Family Historians

The International Society of Family History Writers and Editors (ISFHWE) has announced details of its annual "Excellence in Writing" competition to recognize excellence in genealogical columns and articles. The contest is open to all members of ISFHWE, both published and unpublished, and entrants may join ISFHWE at the time they submit their entries.

The four categories for entries include: Category I – Newspaper Columns published on a regular basis, published in 2008. Entries must be less than 1,000 words. Category II – Articles published in 2008 in a journal, magazine, newsletter, or web site. Entries cannot exceed 5,000 words.

Category III – Genealogy Research Story. This category is for original, unpublished articles between 1,000 – 3,000 words. The articles should focus on telling the story of genealogical research using one of these topics: "The Search for <ancestor's name or nickname>," "Sorting Out the Entangled Roots of <family or individual name>," or "Encounters with a Family Skeleton."

Category IV – Want-to-be Writer/Columnist. Entrants in this category aspire to be writers or columnists in the field of genealogy/family or local history. Submissions in this category must be original and unpublished, between 500-1000 words.

Winners will receive a cash prize and the awards presentation will take place at the ISFHWE banquet at the National Genealogical Society conference in Raleigh, NC, on 13 May 2009. For all rules and information, check the web site at http://isfhwe.org.

Entries must be received by the coordinator NO later than 31 December 2008. Entries must be mailed in time to make this deadline. There is a discount on the entry fee for submission before 30 November 2008.

Footnote.com is a pay-for-view service that offers indexes plus digital pictures of original documents including American Revolutionary War pension application files; Admiralty Records, Key West, Florida 1829-1911; Massachusetts Vital Records Index 1841-1895; and city directories from New York and Chicago. The cost is \$69.95 per year or \$11.95 for a month's membership.
